

Theologian-in-Residence Weekend, February 23-24

Copies of the schedule for the weekend may be picked up from the table at the back of the sanctuary. Gary Dorrien, our 2013 Theologian in Residence, does a masterful job in *The Remaking of Evangelical Theology* (1998) in describing both historically and recently how the word "evangelical" applies to various faith traditions. One of the keystones for conversative evangelicals has been the Bible is without error. In fascinating ways, he points out how their scholars and denominations have tried to interpret what biblical inerrancy means and the problems that results. "Evangelicals are prone to fret that everything will be lost if they have no ground of absolute certainty or no proof that Christianity is superior to Islam or Buddhism. This fear drives them to impose impossible tests on Christian belief." His response? Dorrien says, "It is enough to claim the living Word of God, Jesus Christ, as our foundation in a lost and tormented world, without thinking that this claim has to be ground in a deeper universal foundation."
