FROM THE INTERIM PASTOR

We are now well into Lent, which, not unlike an interim period, calls us to reflect on our lives, on who we are, and on where we are going.

I am deeply appreciative of the opportunity to accompany you on both of these journeys—the interim journey and the Lenten journey. As far as the interim journey goes, the “Morning to Remember” gave me a good understanding of where you have been as a congregation; I hope it did the same for you! The Pastoral Search Committee will next be inviting you to share with them, in small groups, your hopes and fears for this church, and those aspects of this congregation that are most precious to you.

For the Lenten journey, we will continue the soup suppers followed each week by a Taize service, called “Prayers around the Cross,” in which we pray through song, words, and silence, and place lighted candles as signs of prayer around the cross.

For Holy Week, First United Methodist Church and First Christian Church will join us here for a joint Maundy Thursday Service; at noon on Friday our three churches will join together for a Good Friday Processional through the streets of Downtown; and our sanctuary will be open from noon to 3 p.m. and from 5 to 7 p.m. for you to drop in and do the prayer stations set up in the sanctuary, each station focusing on a different one of the Seven Last Words of Jesus.

Step-by-step we move forward, closer to the cross, closer to Easter, closer to the future God has in store for us.

Maundy Thursday Service April 17



Ames United Church of Christ, First United Methodist Church, and First Christian Church will join for a Maundy Thursday service at 7 p.m. April 17 at Ames UCC. "Maundy" comes from the Latin word "mandatum," which means "commandment." On Maundy Thursday, we honor Christ's commands to love one another as he loves us, and to share his supper. The service, which includes communion, will move us from the washing of the disciples' feet, to the Last Supper, to Jesus' arrest in the Garden of Gethsemane. Please join us as we follow Jesus toward the Cross.



April 18

Good Friday Processional at Noon at Bandshell Park

Ames UCC, First United Methodist and First Christian churches will gather at the bandshell at 5th and Duff. There we will hear the story of Jesus' trial and sentencing and then process down Main Street with the cross. When we get to the train depot, the rest of the scripture, through when Jesus takes his last breath, will be read. This is a meaningful way to involve our whole selves in the story of Christ's passion.

Be sure to join us for Holy Communion every Sunday throughout Lent.



Good Friday Prayer Stations in the UCC sanctuary

from noon-3 p.m. and from 5 to 7 p.m.

What's a Prayer Station?

Rather than having a Good Friday service at the church, prayer stations based on the Seven Last Words of Jesus will be set up in the sanctuary. So you may be wondering:



What exactly is a prayer station?

Prayer stations can be different things, but in this case, tables will be set up with a reading (one of the Seven Last Words, drawn from the different Gospel accounts of the Passion), a written prayer, and some kind of action related to the particular reading.



How long does it take?

That depends on you. If you move through the stations quickly, it may only take 20 minutes. If you wish to linger, it may take as long as you wish.



Why are we doing this?

As you go through the stations individually, at your own pace, you will accompany Jesus through his last hours. Because there are two separate drop-in periods, the hope is that anyone who wishes will be able to come at some time in the day, as opposed to a separate service at a set time.

Youth Mission Trip

From July 20-25 the Ames UCC youth will journey to the Heifer Project Ranch in Perryville, Arkansas, a working example of sustainable agriculture like the Heifer Project supports around the world. The Heifer Ranch includes a "Global Village" housing more than 15 species of animals, organic gardens and an International Shop.



At the ranch workers raise most of the donated livestock for the project's global work. The Heifer Project's mission is ... "attempting to end world hunger and poverty and caring for the earth." In preparation for the trip, the youth will be inviting the congregation's participation in several fund raisers. Search Committee

Over the past few weeks, we have continued to meet weekly, and we are working diligently, joyfully, and prayerfully. In addition to these meetings, we worked with Pastor Terry to organize and host "A Morning to Remember" on Sunday, March 2. At that event, more than 50 individuals participated, and together, we looked over and added to our church timeline, working to tell and interpret the story of our church, including the joyful, the painful, and all the things in-between that have made us who we are today.

Pastor Terry and members of the Pastoral Search Committee facilitated both large and small discussion groups, and over the course of the morning, we developed meaning statements about who we are as a congregation and what we value most. The meaning statements were posted on the wall, and all participants had the opportunity to select their top three priorities. The goal of prioritizing the meaning statements was to identify qualities that our congregation wants to emphasize and to identify areas for improvement or change. (continued next page)

The search committee has examined the results and identified seven categories of meaning statements. We are now integrating these ideas into our church profile so that we may accurately reflect the prioritized meaning statements.

We thank everyone who participated in "A Morning to Remember" as well as added to the church timeline. Your comments and guidance are very helpful to the committee as we work to develop a profile that accurately represents our church.

We look forward to more opportunities to hear your input, and we are currently preparing the first full draft of the profile, which we will share with you by early May. As we get closer to May, we will schedule a time for the congregation to make comments and ask questions about the draft. During that meeting, we will discuss how the meaning statements, prioritized in order of relative importance in our church life, were integrated into the profile.

365 OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES You Can Do With Your Child by Steve and Ruth Bennett

This is not specifically a children's book but can be used by children or adults. This book has a year-long list of things to do with your child in the outdoors. The games are listed alphabetically and the table of contents shows a picture for each game, name of the activity and a page number. This is user friendly for kids. Each activity has a separate page discussing the activity, what materials are required and other things that are optional. Old favorites are included but so are many new ideas which have been kid-tested. The authors have tried to include activities that foster a love of learning and a sense of family, neighborhood and community. They have included a balance of educational, artistic and sports activities, so there should be something for every child. In the introduction, the authors have a section on safety concerns. The important thing with these activities is that your children get to spend with you (the parent). Check this book out and spend some fun, quality time with children.

Theologian-in-Residence Weekend of 2014 – A Success

In conversations, cards, and e-mails, Theologian-in-Residence (TIR) committee members heard and read words such as “fabulous,” “marvelous,” and “transformative” about the February 22-23 TIR Weekend and the engaging speaker, Phyllis Tickle. The attendance on Saturday was high for all sessions (Session 1—150; Session 2 – 142; Session 3 – 135; Sunday Learning Center – 40; and Sunday worship – 138). A local bookstore selling Phyllis Tickle’s books sold out of all but one book. Publicity about the weekend was unprecedented, including an interview with Phyllis on Iowa Public Radio and two front-page articles in the *Ames Tribune*. The Ames program was cited in the February 19 issue of *The Christian Century*.

The success of the weekend would not have happened without the hard work of more than 40 volunteers and staff. The TIR committee is pleased that donations and revenue have exceeded \$5,400 to date and may reach \$6,000. The cost of the program was \$7,000. There is a specific fund that covers deficits. Through the years, honorarium and travel expenses have increased significantly. Expanded printing and publicity efforts resulted in new attendees. The committee asks members of the congregation to consider a donation to the Theologian-in-Residence program to help maintain this signature event.

Next year's TIR Weekend will be February 28 and March 1, 2015. As part of the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the congregation, the weekend will highlight the role and significance of music, especially congregational singing, in the life of the church. Ruth Duck of Garrett Seminary of Evanston, Ill., a noted hymn writer (14 texts of hymns in the *New Century Hymnal*) and Cynthia Wilson, the Dean of Students at Garrett and accomplished singer and pianist, will be the theologians in residence.

On Sunday, February 16, the congregation dedicated a plaque listing the speakers and themes of the 30 years the program has been offered. Paul Lasley created the wooden base of the historical plaque as well as an announcement plaque, and a "thank you, Nancy Brown" plaque. The three plaques are mounted on a wall in the parlor.

Farm to Folk is offering three different CSA vegetables shares this season, from TableTop Farm, Iowa Fresh Produce and The Homestead. New this year is a meat share from Story City Locker and we continue to offer the dairy share from Picket Fence Creamery and egg shares from a couple of different producers.
