FROM THE INTERIM PASTOR

Exploring Membership

The Invitation and Welcome Team and I have been holding a series of classes for those who are interested (or, at least, curious!) about membership in the congregation. As of this writing, we have had two sessions, with one more to go on June 22, and have been very pleased with the participation: nine in the first session, ten in the second; and while not all of the participants may end up joining, they all gave the same reason for what drew them here: the openness of this congregation's welcome.



Interestingly, when I first asked the Executive Board what they loved most about this church, it was the statement: "Whoever you are, and wherever you are on life's journey, you are welcome here." It is gratifying to learn that others truly experience that welcome.

Another thing we focused on was that this is a non-creedal church: members are not required to adhere to a particular set of beliefs. Instead, this is a covenantal church, in which you pledge to live life together in a particular way for the good of God's reign. We reviewed the congregation's covenant in class, but I thought it would be good for those of you who are already members to be reminded of it. Here it is:

In the name of God and with God as our witness, we promise to be in community with one another as we strive to be faithful disciples of Jesus, whom we proclaim as the Christ, God's Anointed. We profess our belief in God who created and is still creating us. We hold as our vision for the world Jesus' vision of shalom, where all are welcomed, where justice reigns, where all are provided for, and where peace prevails. We affirm that we can only be faithful disciples in community with others who share that vision and who work to achieve it. Therefore, we promise, insofar as we are able, to attend the services of this church, to volunteer our time to its mission, and to contribute financially to its work. Finally, we earnestly pray for the guiding presence of the Holy Spirit that God might bless what we do together.

When the new folks are finally received into membership, I hope that you will renew your own commitment to this covenant. I can't think of anything more important than working toward a world in which all are welcomed, justice reigns, and peace prevails.

The church library has received a number of new books in the last months. About 30 of them are children's books and more are getting ready to be stamped and shelved. Hopefully the children will take advantage of our new books during our Summer Reading Program. (other article in newsletter). We have received books for our Theologian in Residence shelf and also our UCC Book Club Shelf.

We have also received a copy of the Quran (Islam's revealed text) from the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR). This is a part of a project by this organization to Share the Quran. Thus far, they have distributed more than 60,000 copies of this book to policymakers, media professionals and educators as well as to public institutions. The translator is an Austrian-Polish convert to Islam who is known for his scholarship. His translation and commentary is widely considered to be among the best in the English language. Moreover, his translation is complete with the original Arabic, English translation, commentary, historical notes and stunning examples of traditional Arabic calligraphy artwork.

CHILDREN'S BOOK REVIEW

Black is Brown is Tan by Arnold Adoff, illustrated by Emily Arnold McCully

This book is actually a poem about an inter-racial family that has all of the colors of the race. It is a tribute to the diversity of the American family especially with the extended family of Granny white and Grandma black. This is a story about an all-American family, full of joy, warmth and love. The illustrations are bright watercolor paintings that depict a contemporary family and the many activities that they might be involved in. The family plays and works, scolds and teases, and through it all there is joy for their story. A beautiful way to introduce this concept to children and adults. BOOK REVIEW

CREDO by William Sloane Coffin, Westminster John Knox Press, 2004

William Sloane Coffin was a prolific writer throughout his life as a famous preacher, peace monger, supporter of the disenfranchised, civil rights and social justice advocate. He wrote passionately about faith, emphasizing that it is at the very center of all belief and meaningful activity, the critical core of life. In the Preface to this book. "Credo" –

I believe - he states that this best translates "I have given my heart to". The book is a collection of Coffin's "wise sayings" on topics most important to him. These were gathered by his editor and organized into chapters about faith, social justice, civil and economic rights, patriotism, war and peace,

nature, "life in general", the church, the end of life. It is a small book, especially when compared to his other writings, sermons and treatises, but it makes for a very thought-provoking and thoughtful read. Several of my favorite quotes in "Credo" are these:

- -About faith, "I love the recklessness of faith. First you leap, then you grow wings."
- -About faith and justice, "To know God is to do justice."
- -About war and peace, "War is always cause for remorse, never for exhilaration."
- -About life in general, "Our business in life is less making something of ourselves than finding something worth doing and losing ourselves in it."
- -About the church, "Church is where all hearts are one so that nothing else has to be one. Church is where there's such a climate of acceptance that each of us can be his or her unique self."
- -About the end of life, "The one true freedom in life is to come to terms with death, and as early as possible, for death is an event that embraces all our lives. And the only way to have a good death is to lead a good life. Lead a good one, full of curiosity, generosity, and compassion, and there's no need at the close of the day to rage against the dying of the light. We can go gentle into that good night."

William Sloane Coffin's life (1924-2006) was clearly one of passion, of thoughtful study, of reflection, of action, and finally of gratitude to God as he neared the end of his days.

"For the compassions that fail not, I find myself saying daily to my loving Maker, 'I can no other answer make than thanks, and thanks, and ever thanks.'"



News from our Search Committee

The Search Committee met with Jonna Jensen, associate conference minister, on May 19 for our second training session. This training session was designed to prepare us for the exciting and holy work of reading ministerial profiles and conversations with searching pastors.

On June 3, our vacancy will be listed in the national United Church Employment Opportunities document. A candidate who has completed a UCC Ministerial Profile, whose ecclesiastical credentials are in order, and who has followed the procedures of a particular Conference or Association has the right to have that profile submitted to any vacant church in the United Church of Christ. The conference office will forward to us the ministerial profiles of those candidates interested in our profile. At that point, the Search Committee will start the work of reviewing ministerial profiles. This is an open ended process where the Search Committee will be reviewing new profiles, following up on received profiles, interviewing and discerning. This process will not stop until the Search Committee and the searching pastor both discern that they are called toward one another. Jonna has indicated that she anticipates that we will receive a large response to our vacancy.

The following is the brief description of our church and the qualities we seek in a pastor that will go on the national listing:

"Ames UCC is a warm, engaging and active congregation with a rich history (we are the oldest church in Ames, celebrating 150 years in 2015). We are an Open and Affirming, Just Peace congregation that is active in social justice. The successful candidate for Ames UCC is a candidate who is warm and compassionate, as well as intellectually stimulating, and ready for the gifts and challenges that come with serving a church in a university town. We are looking for someone to challenge and guide us to growth, both spiritually and in numbers."
