*CALL TO WORSHIP

A formal, and mutual, invitation to move into the worship experience.

One: Christ is in our midst! How will you bid him welcome?

Many: We will throw open the doors to our hearts. We will delight in his presence.

One: When God shows up, surprising things can happen.

Many: We will make ourselves ready.

We will lay down our burdens and set aside our distractions.

One: Here we receive good news: Nothing is too wonderful for God!

Many: So let us laugh and sing, rest and listen, dance and praise— Let us worship God!

HYMN "Hope of the World," Hymn 46, verses 1, 2, & 4

Singing is one way to connect to God through our bodies. We stand up, breathe deep, and let loose. And as Augustine wrote, "(S)he who sings, prays twice."

INVOKING THE HOLY

God is always with us, so this "invoking" or invitation to God, is really an invitation to our own selves to become aware of that constant presence.

One: Wonderful, surprising God, you bring us hope when we are discouraged, peace when we are anxious, and joy when we are least expecting it. Help us, now, to rest in your presence. Be our welcome Guest not only here but everywhere we go this week. Show us how to receive all that you have to offer us. May we remain open even to what seems too incredible to be true, for with you, so much more is possible than we even imagine. We pray this in the name of your most Glorious Impossible, Jesus the Christ.

All: Amen.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Confession has a long tradition in Christian history. It is a way to name our own brokenness and failing, sometimes generically and sometimes quite specifically, as a means to cleanse our hearts as we move through the service.

All: Gracious, inviting God,

you continually provide us with opportunities to practice generous hospitality. But our fear of difference, reluctance to share, and desire to be in control make our welcome appear weak and insincere.

Because we long for what is familiar and comfortable, we have difficulty honoring the stranger as a sacred guest

who bears the face of Christ.

Worn out and irritated by the work we think we must do, we miss opportunities to receive the gifts that such guests offer us.

Forgive us, O God, for focusing on the wrong things.

Show us how to do what is right.

SILENT PERSONAL CONFESSION

A brief moment to reflect on the prayer and your own heart and life. Silence is as important as noise in our dialogue with the divine.

WORDS OF ASSURANCE

As a people of Easter, there is always good news: when we die to our brokenness, we live again in hope.

One: The Psalmist declares that those who speak the truth from their heart will abide in God's sanctuary. God hears the difficult truths we have named aloud and in the silence of our hearts. Now let the wonderful gift of God's forgiveness flow through you. May the abundance of God's mercy and grace set you free to serve God with love.

Many: Thanks be to God! Amen.

CHILDREN'S CELEBRATION WITH BLESSING OF BACKPACKS

Children are very important to our church. Each service they come forward for a special lesson just for them. We want all children to know they are welcome everywhere in our sanctuary, even – especially – at the very front. We sing the song below as they come forward.

In Christ there is no East or West in Christ no South or North. But one community of love throughout the whole wide earth!

CHRISTIAN TESTAMENT Hebrews 4:14-5:10 (New Revised Standard Version)

Since, then, we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast to our confession. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

Every high priest chosen from among mortals is put in charge of things pertaining to God on their behalf, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He is able to deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is subject to weakness; and because of this he must offer sacrifice for his own sins as well as for those of the people. And one does not presume to take this honor, but takes it only when called by God, just as Aaron was.

So also Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him,

"You are my Son,
today I have begotten you";
```

as he says also in another place,

"You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek."

In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

DAILY DEVOTIONALS

August 23-29, 2015

God's Story Our Story

Devotion: Use this resource at home to guide your daily devotions.

Find a routine that works best for you.

Pray: Light a candle and open your devotion time with a prayer.

Great High Priest, you know the trials and sufferings of humanity yet remained in love and a lover. Show us how to treat each other with the compassion you showed to us. Amen.

Reflect: Reflect on the key verses from Sunday's reading.

Since, then, we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast to our confession. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin. Hebrews 4:14-15

Study: Study the reading and consider the background.

Jesus, called the Great High Priest by the author(s) of Hebrews, responded to God's call to minister to the world, not just his own community. These duties included blessing the people. Jesus is accessible and understands the human plight and lived through the temptations and trials of humanity.

Read the following daily readings to deepen your understanding of Sunday's text. After the reading, ask the follow-up questions.

Sunday, Hebrews 4:14 – 5:10, Jesus the Great High Priest

Monday, Hebrews 9:15-22, Mediator of a New Covenant

Tuesday, Hebrews 9:23-28, Christ's Sacrifice

Wednesday, Hebrews 10:1-18, Christ's Sacrifice

Thursday, Hebrews 10:19-25, Call to Perseverance

Friday, Hebrews 10:26-31, Call to Perseverance

Saturday, Hebrews 10:32-39, Call to Perseverance

What does it mean that Jesus is the Great High Priest? What other images can you think of for Jesus that speak to you?

Connect: Connect in conversation with others. Discuss the following questions, or simply check in with "Highs" and "Lows."

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

Where do you see Christianity persevere in your community? How does your expression of Christianity look the same as it did at the time of Jesus? How does it look different?

Do you think there is a limit to how much suffering people can endure? What is your limit?

Do: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Consider how you have struggled to persevere as a Christian in your community. Have you struggled to share your faith with others? To live by the values your faith professes? To make sense of the differing faiths of others you are close to? Be intentional this week to work at perseverance in the area you struggle with the most.

Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May Jesus, the Great High Priest, bless you each and every day. Amen.
