CANDLE OF LOVE

One: Elizabeth was barren with no hope for a child, but then a baby filled her womb. The presence of new life filled her with hope.

Many: May the light of Christ fill us with hope.

One: Elizabeth did not know why Mary came rushing through her doors, but the leap of her unborn child filled her with the knowledge of the Lord. The knowledge of the Lord filled her with peace.

Many: May the light of Christ fill us with peace.

One: John the Baptist, while in the womb of his mother, expressed the joy of generations to come. The faith of Mary filled the unborn babe with joy.

Many: May the light of Christ fill us with joy.

One: In a moment filled with hope, in a moment filled with peace, in a moment filled with joy, Mary opens her mouth to sing, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior..." Mary rejoices in the God who loves the oppressed; Mary rejoices in the God who loves hungry. Mary a maiden, Mary unseen by the powerful of the world, is filled with the light and made powerful by a God bent on overturning the world with a teenage girl and newborn babe.

Many: Like the first disciple Mary, let the light of Christ fill us with love.

One: Please join me in prayer.

Many: God of Love, we thank you for bringing the light of Christ into the world.

May the love shared by Elizabeth and Mary serve as a beacon for our own affections.

May we, like Mary, create love that exalts the lowly

May we all bear the light that changes the world. Amen.

CALL TO WORSHIP

A formal and mutual invitation to move into the worship experience.

One: We look for an extraordinary sign of hope for our world but God's sign is most

ordinary of all:

Many: A young woman is with child.

One: We look to power for strength in our world but God points to the most

vulnerable:

Many: She gives birth.

One: We look far and wide for a key to God's mystery, but God points us home:

Many: She calls this child Emmanuel: God-with-us!

One: Let us rejoice, and worship our God

Many: in our ordinary, vulnerable lives: God-with-us!

HYMN "Awake to Change" (insert)

Singing is one way to connect to God through our bodies. We stand up, breathe deep, and let loose. And as Augustine wrote, "(S)he who sings, prays twice."

INVOKING THE HOLY

God is always with us, so this "invoking" or invitation to God, is really an invitation to our own selves to become aware of that constant presence.

One: Surprising God, you make your presence known in unexpected ways, and challenge our comfortable assumptions about how you work. Meet us here today and open our hearts to recognize you in our midst calling us to live into your new thing: a world where your love takes shape in justice and peace. In the name of the One who is coming, we pray:

Many: Amen!

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Confession has a long tradition in Christian history. It is a way to name our own brokenness and failing, sometimes generically and sometimes quite specifically, as a means to cleanse our hearts as we move through the service.

One: In this last week before Christmas, the busyness and the anxieties of this holiday season may overwhelm us, and keep us from feeling the wonder of these days. Let us take a moment to re-order our lives in this reality: In Jesus Christ, the Love, Compassion and Justice of God is breaking into our world.

Silence

One: Give ear, O Shepherd of Israel! You who are enthroned upon the cherubim, shine forth: Stir up your might, and come to save us!

Many: Restore us, O God; let your face shine, and change our lives with your justice.

One: O God of hosts, how long will you be angry with your people's prayers? You have fed us with the bread of tears, and given us tears to drink in full measure.

Many: Restore us, O God; let your face shine, and heal our lives with your compassion.

One: Reveal to us your Promised One, the one whom you made strong for yourself. Then we will never turn back from you; give us life, and we will call on your name.

Many: Restore us, O God; let your face shine, and delight our lives with your love.

SILENT PERSONAL CONFESSION

A brief moment to reflect on the prayer and your own heart and life. Silence is as important as noise in our dialogue with the divine.


ASSURANCE OF PARDON

PRAYER OF OUR SAVIOR

The basics of the Lord's Prayer appear in Matthew 6:9-13 and Luke 11:2-4. It may be familiar to you in this form, or with "sins" or "trespasses" toward the end. We also support the use of traditional or contemporary language for addressing the holy and naming the holy's realm.

Our Father/Creator who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom/kin-dom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom/kin-dom, the power, and the glory, for ever, Amen.

HEBREW BIBLE Psalm 146:5-10

We use "Hebrew Bible" instead of "Old Testament" out of respect for our Jewish sisters and brothers (it isn't old to them) and acknowledgement of the living voice still found in these ancient stories.

Happy are those whose help is the God of Jacob, whose hope is in the LORD their God, who made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them; who keeps faith forever; who executes justice for the oppressed; who gives food to the hungry.

The LORD sets the prisoners free;
the LORD opens the eyes of the blind.
The LORD lifts up those who are bowed down;
the LORD loves the righteous.
The LORD watches over the strangers;
he upholds the orphan and the widow,
but the way of the wicked he brings to ruin.

SACRAMENT OF COMMUNION WITH OFFERING OF FOOD AND GIFTS

Our Communion table is open to all: young and old, faithful and dubious. No one will be turned away. We serve the bread and the juice through "intinction," which means dipping the bread into the juice. Your server will offer each to you with the phrases "the Bread of Life" and "the Cup of Blessing." If you are unable to come forward but would like to participate in the meal, simply wait for your row to be empty, then raise your hand. A server will come to you. The bread is free of gluten, soy, and dairy. If you have brought canned goods for our local food pantries, please set them at the Communion table before being served.

Invitation

One: The prophets foretold it: the desert burst into bloom. Angelic messengers delivered news: a priest lost his speech; a young woman found her voice. In this season of Advent, the scriptures revive old stories and bring new understandings.

Many: In the face of critics and skeptics, our faith cries out, resilient, like a baby from a manger bed.

One: From that Bethlehem beginning, Jesus, baptized in the Jordan, spent his life serving others that all might know the compassionate attention of a loving God.

Many: Today, Jesus serves us yet again, as we gather at this Table he prepares for us.

Prayer

One: Dear Jesus of Advent, you remain a sacred mystery to us. You have brought Good News for all the people and we will not be afraid, for you are here. We are hungry for your love which surpasses all our understanding; we are thirsty for your spirit that never runs dry. In this meal nourish our souls, feed our minds, quench our deepest longings and forgive our transgressions, that we may glorify you every day of our lives.

Many: Amen.

Blessing of the Feast

One: Gathered with his friends, Jesus took bread, broke it and said: Many: "Take and eat, all of you: This is my body, surrendered for you."

One: And pouring the wine:

Many: "Take and drink, all of you: This is the seal of a new covenant, my poured-out life."

All: Holy Creator, Bread of Life, Everlasting Salvation, a light shines in the night and the night will not overcome it. In this meal we have been replenished and strengthened, the light of your love rekindled within.

Welcome Chad Schwickerath To Our Pulpit - Jan. 3

Chad grew up in suburban Ankeny, Iowa, and graduated from Iowa State University. With an interest in church politics and a deep spiritual hunger, he attended Princeton Theological Seminary for his Masters of Divinity. Chad's seminary experience

transformed his worldview by challenging his preconceived notices of right, wrong, and the expected. Seminary allowed Chad to expose and explore previously unacknowledged aspects of his identity, his theology, and his understanding of humanity. After graduation, Chad worked for a housing-first agency, providing programming and crisis-management to homeless young adults in Chicago employing a lens of harm reduction and trauma-informed care. Chad is currently the Annual Fund & Alumni Relations Manager at Chicago Theological Seminary (CTS), one of Ames UCC's mission partners and Pr. Eileen's alma mater. He and his partner live in Hyde Park, Chicago with their feral cat, Ira.
