GOSPEL Mark 1:1-20 (New Revised Standard Version)

Gospel means "good news," making the full title of this book of the Bible "The Good News of Jesus Christ according to Mark."

The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

As it is written in the prophet Isaiah,

"See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight,'"

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

And the Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness. He was in the wilderness forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him.

Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news."

As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the sea—for they were fishermen. And Jesus said to them, "Follow me and I will make you fish for people."

And immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John, who were in their boat mending the nets. Immediately he called them; and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men, and followed him.

Please share your prayer needs as you are so moved.

Pedometer attached to her belt, your mother, spry and strong at eighty, joins the other Methodist Church members in calculating the 5,915 miles, no matter the weather, to add up all the way from Linesville, Pennsylvania to Jerusalem. They need not worry about miracles or pausing at the signs of the cross. They need not stop for security to check their purses for weapons. They need no visa nor baggage, no money to exchange for shekels, no guidebook, no guide. They need no ancient tongue or prophecies. They are, simply, day by day, walking, mile after mile: the sink to the table, uptown to the post office, down the block to visit the sick neighbor. Sundays to and from church. And when they walk far enough, adding up their pedometers together, they will arrive in Jerusalem. And keep walking.

Devotion: Use this resource at home to guide your daily devotions.

Reflect: Reflect on the key verse from Sunday's reading.

I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit. Mark 1:8

Study: Study the reading and consider the background.

Mark's gospel begins with a fiery preacher and a challenging message. No silent night here, no giftbearing visitors. John the Baptist awaits his cousin, Jesus, by a stream in the wilderness. Temptations await Jesus on the other side. Soon, by the lakeshore, the divine call will be irresistible.

Read: Read the following daily readings to deepen your understanding of Sunday's text. After the reading, ask the follow-up questions.

Sunday, Mark 1:1-20, Beginning of Good News Monday, Psalm 91:9-12 Tuesday, Malachi 3:1-7, The Coming Messenger Wednesday, Isaiah 40:1-11, Comfort, Comfort Thursday, Isaiah 44:1-8, God's Blessing on Israel Friday, Joel 2:28-29, God's Spirit Poured Out Saturday, Isaiah 42:1-9, The Servant, a Light to the Nations

How do these Hebrew Bible readings tie into the gospel reading for Sunday?

Connect: Connect in conversation with others. Discuss the following questions, or simply check in with "Highs" and "Lows."

What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?

Why do you think Jesus' ministry began with his baptism? What does your baptism mean to you? How do you make it known that you are a disciple of Jesus? What could you do to make Christ known through the way you live your life?

<u>Do</u>: By acting on what we learn, we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week. Make a list of 5 ways your life could be a proclamation of Jesus' presence in your life. Focus on doing more of one of those throughout the week.

Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

May God fill your life with the good news of eternal life. Amen.

Guest Preacher Chad Schwickerath on January 3

Chad grew up in suburban Ankeny, Iowa, and graduated from Iowa State University. With an interest in church politics and a deep spiritual hunger, he attended Princeton Theological Seminary for his Masters of Divinity. Chad's seminary experience transformed his worldview by challenging his preconceived notices of right, wrong, and the expected. Seminary allowed Chad to expose and explore previously unacknowledged aspects of his identity, his



theology, and his understanding of humanity. After graduation, Chad worked for a housing-first agency, providing programming and crisis-management to homeless young adults in Chicago employing a lens of harm reduction and trauma-informed care. Chad is currently the Annual Fund & Alumni Relations Manager at Chicago Theological Seminary (CTS), one of Ames UCC's mission partners and Pr. Eileen's alma mater. He and his partner live in Hyde Park, Chicago with their feral cat, Ira.

"Worshiping with congregations gives me the opportunities to take part in that on-going dialogue between CTS and its supportive churches. It provides opportunity to challenge and be challenged in our work together. It is a constant reminder that the ministry of CTS impacts and is impacted far beyond the walls of our building and the streets of our city. Coming to Ames United Church of Christ is, in a sense, also a homecoming for me. It is a return to the state that raised me and a return to the town where I attended college. I look forward to worshiping with you."
