



PASTORAL SEARCH COMMITTEE UPDATE

January 15, 2015

Since June, 2014 when our church profile was posted nationally, the Pastoral Search Committee has reviewed 64 profiles, the majority of which were submitted at the request of the searching minister. We have requested and reviewed additional materials, including sermons, church bulletins, newsletters and other information from 12 candidates. We conducted Skype interviews with three candidates, and conducted one in-person interview.

In October, the committee placed a hold on receiving additional profiles, as we were particularly drawn to one candidate. We conducted an extensive three-day interview with the candidate, and appreciated the involvement of church members in this effort. A candidate weekend planned for November 14-16 was cancelled when our discernment with the candidate did not result in a call. We immediately requested that our profile be re-activated and since the end of November we have evaluated 11 candidates and conducted one Skype interview.

On January 12, we met with Jonna Jensen, the lowa conference associate minister, and Phil Spike. The purpose of the meeting was to assess the status and process of our search and to recharge our efforts in searching for a pastor. We were pleased that Jonna felt we were right on schedule, that we had a very strong, attractive profile and that our search protocol was appropriate for our church profile. She assured us that the average search time for a pastor is approximately 12-18 months and that there would be no shortage of profiles to review.

We continue to meet most Monday evenings as we review profiles and communicate with pastoral candidates and their references. During the search process, the names of candidates and information pertaining to them will be held in strict confidence within our committee, but every effort will be made to keep the congregation informed of our progress, and to be mindful of your thoughts on pastoral leadership.

Members of the Search committee will be available during the coffee time following the January 18 service to answer your questions and listen to your thoughts.

We ask that you keep us in your prayers as we pursue this search.

Nursery Care: We welcome children to stay during our worship service...in fact, we enjoy it! Our nursery is located on the second floor on the east side of the church building, and a parent or guardian will be required to sign their child in and out. Please feel free to use this service.

Godly Play: Join us during the Sunday School hour for *Godly Play!* On the second Sunday through the end of the month, children ages Kindergarten through 5th grade are invited upstairs to experience a story from the Bible and then create, play, or act out their ideas. The first week of the month will feature *speed rotations*, where children experience a Bible story through an action-packed variety of activities. *Godly Play* is also offered during worship on the first Sunday of each month, following the Children's Message.

Bell Ringing for Peace: Join us every Wednesday at 12:10 p.m. in the bell tower to ring the bell and pray for worldwide peace. Ames UCC is a Just Peace church, encouraging the interrelation of friendship, justice, and common security from violence.

Communion: Jesus included everyone present in the meals he shared, and so do we. The bread we use is free of gluten, soy, and dairy products (it does contain eggs); and the wine is unfermented (aka "juice"). In our theological understanding, it is not the bread or the wine that is changed in Communion, but we who are changed in the sharing of it. If you are here on a Communion Sunday, we hope you will join us in this transformative meal.
