*CALL TO WORSHIP

A formal and mutual invitation to move into the worship experience

One: Come away, disciples of Christ, and rest from your labors. Many: We are weary from our work.

One: Come away, disciples of Christ, and leave the demands of the crowds. Many: There are always more who need our help.

One: Come away, disciples of Christ, and be renewed in fellowship with our shepherd.

Many: We, too, love the sheep, but need our own renewal. We, too, need to hear anew the teachings of Jesus, to give us strength for the journey.

One: Come away, disciples of Christ, and draw courage from the one who gives us peace.

Singing is one way to connect to God through our bodies. We stand up, breathe deep, and let loose. And as Augustine wrote, "(S)he who sings, prays twice.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Confession has a long tradition in Christian history. It is a way to name our own brokenness and failing, sometimes generically, and sometimes quite specifically, as a means to cleanse our hearts as we move through the service.

One: Reconciling God, proclaim peace to us once more. Put to death all hostility within us, and help us be one with our enemies, that we may all be members of your household. Remove the animosities to which we cling, and be our shepherd, even as we are the sheep of your pasture, through Jesus Christ, our guide and guardian.

Many: O God, the rock of our salvation, your faithfulness is as constant as the North Star. But your holiness frightens us, for the justice of your love brings judgment on our lives. Like David before us, we would rather build you a temple and keep you safely in one place, than have you move about with us in a tabernacle, and be everywhere we go.

Like the psalmist, we would rather shout the certainty of your favor, a favor as predictable as the rising sun and moon, than face the possibility that our peace may come – not through strength of arms, but through the love of a shepherd for the lost sheep of our world.

SILENT PERSONAL CONFESSION

A brief moment to reflect on the prayer, and on your own heart and life. Silence is as important as noise in our dialogue with the Divine.

WORDS OF ASSURANCE

As a people of Easter, there is always good news: when we die to our brokenness, we live again in hope.

One: In Christ, we are citizens with the saints as members of the household of God.

Many: In Christ, we are built spiritually into a holy temple of God, a dwelling place for the Holy Spirit. Thanks be to God!

CHILDRENS CELEBRATION

Children are very important to our church. Each service they come forward for a special lesson just for them. We want all children to know they are welcome everywhere in our sanctuary, even – especially – at the very front.

GOSPEL

Gospel means "good news," making the full title of this book of the Bible, "The Good News of Jesus Christ According to John."

John 6:1-21 (Modified for Inclusive Language)

After this, Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain, and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jewish faith, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Phillip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Phillip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down."

Now there was a great deal of grass in the place, so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign

that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough, because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.

Communion: Jesus included everyone present in the meals he shared, and so do we. The bread we use is free of gluten, soy, and dairy products (it does contain eggs); and the wine is unfermented (aka "juice"). In our theological understanding, it is not the bread or the wine that is changed in Communion, but *we* who are changed in the sharing of it. If you are here on a Communion Sunday, we hope you will join us in this transformative meal.
