CANDLE OF HOPE

- One: We light this candle in HOPE. We bring this light of hope with us, together, on this journey. Hope comes from the Child and our hope is dedicated to the Child lying in a manger. Seeking goodness only, for our neighbors and for ourselves, may we kindle God's light of hope within us. Let us pray together.
- Many: Good and gracious God, God of darkness and light, God of hope and fear, help us take one step closer to you, toward the joy of unity with you. In this candle light,
 - show us that the power of hope silences doubts and fears. Take this light, small but mighty, and magnify it within us until our hope chases away all shadows around our church, our community, our nations and our world. Amen.

CALL TO WORSHIP

A formal and mutual invitation to move into the worship experience.

- One: In Advent we watch and wait, and prepare to welcome the Christ Child into the world.
- Many: Come, Lord Jesus, come!
- One: In Advent we prepare for a life of discipleship, and watch faithfully for signs of God's light breaking into the world.
- Many: Come, Lord Jesus, come!

- One: As we wait, dear One, we watch for signs of your action in the world, actions of compassion and grace breaking in.
- Many: Come, Lord Jesus, come!
- One: Holy God, we recognize that we do not know the day or the hour, but we know that the day is near.
- Many: Come, Lord Jesus, come! Be born anew in our world and in our lives.

Singing is one way to connect to God through our bodies. We stand up, breathe deep, and let loose. And as Augustine wrote, "(S)he who sings, prays twice."

INVOKING THE HOLY

God is always with us, so this "invoking" or invitation to God, is really an invitation to our own selves to become aware of that constant presence.

One: In this season as the days grow shorter and the shadows lengthen, we gather in eager expectation for the Light of the World to dawn. Help us, God, to lay aside all the works of night and even our cynicism as we enter this sacred season. During this hour of worship, send your Spirit to empower us to live in the light with hope. Amen.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Confession has a long tradition in Christian history. It is a way to name our own brokenness and failing, sometimes generically and sometimes quite specifically, as a means to cleanse our hearts as we move through the service.

Many: Holy and Loving God,

- we give thanks for the promise of this sacred season
- and for the joy we find in the Christ Child.
- Yet even as we rejoice, we recognize that we often fail
- to live with the hope of redemption.
- In this season of anticipation,
- we know that we are easily distracted by our own projects and preparation.
- We lose focus on the one who is the Source of our joy.
- Forgive us, God, and restore our hope in you. Amen.

SILENT PERSONAL CONFESSION

A brief moment to reflect on the prayer and your own heart and life. Silence is as important as noise in our dialogue with the divine.

ASSURANCE OF PARDON


As a people of Easter, there is always good news: when we die to our brokenness, we live again in hope.

One: The promise of the season of Advent is the promise of Emmanuel, God with us. Jesus calls us to keep awake so that we are ready for God's arrival. Therefore, let us lay aside all those things that distract us from faithful watching for God. Friends, believe the Good News of the Gospel:

Many: In Jesus Christ, we are forgiven.

CHILDREN'S CELEBRATION

Children are very important to our church. Each service they come forward for a special lesson just for them. We want all children to know they are welcome everywhere in our sanctuary, even – especially – at the very front. We sing the song below as they come forward.



HEBREW BIBLE2 Kings 22:1-10, 23:1-3 (Good News Translation)We use "Hebrew Bible" instead of "Old Testament" out of respect for our Jewish sisters and brothers (it isn't old to them) and acknowledgement of the living voice still found in these ancient stories.

Josiah was eight years old when he became king of Judah, and he ruled in Jerusalem for thirty-one years. His mother was Jedidah, the daughter of Adaiah from the town of Bozkath. Josiah did what was pleasing to the LORD; he followed the example of his ancestor King David, strictly obeying all the laws of God. In the eighteenth year of his reign, King Josiah sent the court secretary Shaphan, the son of Azaliah and grandson of Meshullam, to the Temple with the order: "Go to the High Priest Hilkiah and get a report on the amount of money that the priests on duty at the entrance to the Temple have collected from the people. Tell him to give the money to the men who are in charge of the repairs in the Temple. They are to pay the carpenters, the builders, and the masons, and buy the timber and the stones used in the repairs. The men in charge of the work are thoroughly honest, so there is no need to require them to account for the funds."

Shaphan delivered the king's order to Hilkiah, and Hilkiah told him that he had found the book of the teachings in the Temple. Hilkiah gave him the book, and Shaphan read it.

King Josiah summoned all the leaders of Judah and Jerusalem, and together they went to the Temple, accompanied by the priests and the prophets and all the rest of the people, rich and poor alike. Before them all the king read aloud the whole book of the covenant which had been found in the Temple. He stood by the royal column and made a covenant with the LORD to obey him, to keep his laws and commands with all his heart and soul, and to put into practice the demands attached to the covenant, as written in the book. And all the people promised to keep the covenant.

Cans for Communion - Dec. 20

On the third Sunday of each month we gather together to feast at God's open table. It is a time of reconciliation and renewal, leaving us stronger and spiritually fed.

However, many people in our community (even in our church) struggle with being actually fed. In Story County, 15% of individuals have either low or very low food security. As lowa State researchers describe, "Low food secure households have difficulty at some time during the year providing enough food for all their members. In very low food secure households, the food intake of some household members is reduced and normal eating patterns are disrupted at times during the year due to limited resources."

Starting Sunday, December 20, the Social Justice team and I invite you to bring canned and other non-perishable goods to our Communion table. Simply place them on or around the table before you take part in the meal. If you are able, bring extras to share with those who are unable to contribute. After worship we will take everything to Food at First for distribution in the community.

God's table is larger than we can imagine. Let us set more places each and every time we feast. –Pr. Eileen

United Church of Christ Christmas Fund - Dec. 20

We will also take a special offering for the Christmas Fund on December 20th. The Christmas fund is an offering that provides financial assistance to retired UCC clergy and lay employees, groups that are historically (and often still) underpaid and unable to save for retirement. This offering funds pension and health premium supplementation, Christmas "thank you" gift checks, and even emergency grants for active or retired clergy and employees.
