PASSING OF THE PEACE

Passing the Peace is an ancient Christian tradition in which we show we carry no weapons, only love.

CALL TO WORSHIP

A formal and mutual invitation to move into the worship experience.

One: We are your people—no matter the circumstances of our lives in pastor or present times. There are many options before us, but not all lead to the abundance of life you have to offer. May we cling to your promise that you are always there with us.

Many: Wipe away our tears and give us the joy of your love.

Open our spirits to the possibilities of new faith experiences.

HYMN "Community of Christ" (Hymn 314)

Singing is one way to connect to God through our bodies. We stand up, breathe deep, and let loose. And as Augustine wrote, "(S)he who sings, prays twice."

INVOKING THE HOLY

God is always with us, so this "invoking" or invitation to God, is really an invitation to our own selves to become aware of that constant presence.

One: Holy, holy, we know you are with us all the days of our lives, when we are faithful and when we stray. Let us feel that resounding truth in our worship this day.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Confession has a long tradition in Christian history. It is a way to name our own brokenness and failing, sometimes generically and sometimes quite specifically, as a means to cleanse our hearts as we move through the service.

Many: O God, constant and compassionate, you protect those who trust in you.

Each new day you call us to venture from our homes and families and to follow you into difficult places

among people we may consider strangers.

But we often fear change and only go among strangers when pressed.

Forgive us for not seeing how your way wanders among all.

Forgive us for staying only on our street corner.

SILENT PERSONAL CONFESSION

A brief moment to reflect on the prayer and your own heart and life. Silence is as important as noise in our dialogue with the divine.


WORDS OF ASSURANCE

As a people of Easter, there is always good news: when we die to our brokenness, we live again in hope.

One: We, like Ruth, will find God's blessing in the wandering in our lives, no matter how small our journey may be. We are always sheltered under God's wings, our true home in faith. Amen.

CHILDREN'S CELEBRATION

Children are very important to our church. Each service they come forward for a special lesson just for them. We want all children to know they are welcome everywhere in our sanctuary, even – especially – at the very front. We sing the song below as they come forward.



HEBREW BIBLE The Book of Ruth: A Reader's Theater

New Revised Standard Version, modified for inclusive language. We use "Hebrew Bible" instead of "Old Testament" out of respect for our Jewish sisters and brothers (it isn't old to them) and acknowledgement of the living voice still found in these ancient stories.

Our players today, in the order in which they read, are Linda Shenk (narrator), Sharron Slinger (Naomi), Amanda Petefish-Schrag (Ruth), Eileen Gebbie (Orpah and Woman), Dan Coffey (Boaz), and Bill Yungclas (Foreman and Kinsman and Elders).

HOMILY AND SACRAMENT OF HOLY COMMUNION

Our Communion table is open to all: young and old, faithful and dubious. No one will be turned away. We serve the bread and the juice through "intinction," which means dipping the bread into the juice. The bread is free of gluten, soy, and dairy; the cup contains grape juice.

Invitation

One: Come, you who are homeless and hungry, you who have safety and food, come. Jesus calls us to dine as friends, come, God's feast of welcome awaits us.

Prayer

One: Let us pray.

Many: God of Naomi, God of Ruth, and God of Boaz strengthen us this day to stand with those in need to give generously of what we have.

Help us expand our understanding of family so that we may ensure that no one goes unloved, no one is left unprotected.

Sharing the Meal

Prayer of Thanksgiving

One: Let us pray.

Many: May the blessings of this table strengthen our faith, increase our generosity and unify our hearts, we pray in the name of Jesus, the Rising One. Amen.

PRAYER OF OUR SAVIOR

The basics of the Lord's Prayer appear in Matthew 6:9-13 and Luke 11:2-4. It may be familiar to you in this form, or with "sins" or "trespasses" toward the end. We also support the use of traditional or contemporary language for addressing the holy and naming the holy's realm.

Our Father/Creator who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom/kin-dom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom/kin-dom, the power, and the glory, for ever and ever, Amen.
