PASSING OF THE PEACE Passing the Peace is an ancient Christian tradition in which we show we carry no weapons, only love.

CALL TO WORSHIP *A formal and mutual invitation to move into the worship experience.*

One: Praise waits for you, O God, in all your world!

Many: You hear our prayers, forgive our sins and call us to dwell with you!

One: God of our hope, you are the life of the entire world. Many: Your faithfulness calls forth songs of joy from the ends of the earth.

One: You formed the mountains and still the roaring sea. You calm the uproar of the nations. You care for the land, bless it with water, and fill it with grain to feed the people.

Many: Let all creation shout and sing for joy.

HYMN "To You, O God, All Creatures Sing" (Hymn 17 verses 1-4) Singing is one way to connect to God through our bodies. We stand up, breathe deep, and let loose. And as Augustine wrote, "(S)he who sings, prays twice."

CALL TO CONFESSION

Confession has a long tradition in Christian history. It is a way to name our own brokenness and failing, sometimes generically and sometimes quite specifically, as a means to cleanse our hearts as we move through the service.

One: Giver of the Sabbath, come into our midst and bless our Sabbath observance with your loving presence.

Many: Come among us, God.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

All: Loving God, we know that in every life trials of our bodies, minds, resources, and faith will come to us. We give you thanks that your still speaking voice sustains us through each one. Yet we confess that we fail to hear your voice when it comes from an unexpected place. We confess that we fail to see restoration after a time of trial, when it takes an unexpected form. Forgive us, God. Restore us with humility and awaken us anew to your presence and your promise. Amen.

SILENT PERSONAL CONFESSION

A brief moment to reflect on the prayer and your own heart and life. Silence is as important as noise in our dialogue with the divine.


WORDS OF ASSURANCE

As a people of Easter, there is always good news: when we die to our brokenness, we live again in hope.

One: The God of creation is a God of mercy. God is quick to forgive and God's promise of restoration is for all people. Friends have faith the Good News of the Gospel. Amen!

CHILDREN'S CELEBRATION

Children are very important to our church. Each service they come forward for a special lesson just for them. We want all children to know they are welcome everywhere in our sanctuary, even – especially – at the very front. We sing the song below as they come forward.



HEBREW BIBLE 2 Samuel 5:1-5; 6:1-5 (Good News Translation) We use "Hebrew Bible" instead of "Old Testament" out of respect for our Jewish sisters and brothers (it isn't old to them) and acknowledgement of the living voice still found in these ancient stories.

Then all the tribes of Israel went to David at Hebron and said to him, "We are your own flesh and blood. In the past, even when Saul was still our king, you led the people of Israel in battle, and the LORD promised you that you would lead his people and be their ruler." So all the leaders of Israel came to King David at Hebron. He made a sacred alliance with them, they anointed him, and he became king of Israel. David was thirty years old when he became king, and he ruled for forty years. He ruled in Hebron over Judah for seven and a half years, and in Jerusalem over all Israel and Judah for thirty-three years.

Once more David called together the best soldiers in Israel, a total of thirty thousand men, and led them to Baalah in Judah, in order to bring from there God's Covenant Box, bearing the name of the LORD Almighty, whose throne is above the winged creatures. They took it from Abinadab's home on the hill and placed it on a new cart. Uzzah and Ahio, sons of Abinadab, were guiding the cart, with Ahio walking in front. David and all the Israelites were dancing and singing with all their might to honor the LORD. They were playing harps, lyres, drums, rattles, and cymbals.

HEBREW BIBLE Psalm 150 as a responsive litany (Good News Translation)

One: Praise the LORD!

Many: Praise God in his Temple!

Praise his strength in heaven! Praise him for the mighty things he has done. Praise his supreme greatness.

One: Praise him with trumpets. Praise him with harps and lyres. Praise him with drums and dancing. Praise him with harps and flutes. Praise him with cymbals. Praise him with loud cymbals.

Many: Praise the LORD, all living creatures! Praise the LORD!


The 150th Anniversary Celebration is Next Sunday, November 1st!

- George Washington Carver came to Sunday evening services and attended the Christian Endeavor group meetings when he was a student at ISC?
- The concept for joint services with the First Christian Church began in the early 1960s in conversations between Rev. Roy Key of First Christian Church and Rev. Russell Fate of the First Congregational Church?
- Keith Dickson, the long-time Treasurer of the church became a member of the United Church of Christ's Board for Homeland Ministries?
- Min Arther, long-time chair of our Social Action Committee, became a member of the United Church of Christ's Board for World Ministries?
- Abbie Sawyer volunteered to wash and repair the choir robes?
- Lorna Borgstrom, an ISU student and Frisbie Fellowship member, was President of a natonal organization of students involved with campus ministries (1963)
- When our congregation debated between 1957 (the date of the merger of the Congregational-Christian and Evangelical & Reformed Church) and 1964 if its name should be changed, the Pilgrim Fellowship/Youth Fellowship asked, "Why should we quibble over a name?"
