CALL TO WORSHIP Debi Smith Ford

A formal and mutual invitation to move into the worship experience.

One: God, we cannot believe we are worthy to have you come under our roof and sometimes we cannot believe other people are worthy of your presence

Many: And yet, you have made your home among your all people,

calling us beloved.

Let us rejoice! Amen.

HYMN "Carry the Light," (insert)

Singing is one way to connect to God through our bodies. We stand up, breathe deep, and let loose. And as Augustine wrote, "(S)he who sings, prays twice."

Today we are learning a new "end of worship" song. In order to be able to really belt it out, to really sing the message, when the time comes, we are singing it as our "start of worship" song, too!

INVOKING THE HOLY

God is always with us, so this "invoking" or invitation to God, is really an invitation to our own selves to become aware of that constant presence.

One: Holiness, You are the fabric of heaven and earth. Look upon us kindly and grow our faith so that we would always know your presence as our loving teacher, inviter, and example. In Jesus' name, amen.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Confession has a long tradition in Christian history. It is a way to name our own brokenness and failing, sometimes generically and sometimes quite specifically, as a means to cleanse our hearts as we move through the service.

One: We confess our brokenness before God and one another. Light of the world,

Many: Your patience with us is never ending.

You have shown us wonders, yet we are so often complacent.

You have showered us with mercy,

yet we withhold mercy from others.

You have given us everything,

and we act as though we were entitled all along.

Forgive us these and all our secret sins.

You know our hearts;

we implore you to make us whole again. Amen.

SILENT PERSONAL CONFESSION

A brief moment to reflect on the prayer and your own heart and life. Silence is as important as noise in our dialogue with the divine.

WORDS OF ASSURANCE

As a people of Easter, there is always good news: when we die to our brokenness, we live again in hope.

One: The words of Jesus are trustworthy: Faith can make you well. May our hearts overflow with gratitude at the gift of God's mercy, and may we also be merciful in our turn. In the name of Jesus, Amen.

Passing the Peace is an ancient Christian tradition in which we show we carry no weapons, only love.

GOSPEL Luke 7:1-17 (English Standard Version) Jim Coppoc

Gospel means "good news," making the full title of this book of the Bible "The Good News of Jesus Christ according to Luke." We will stay in this book of the Bible until after Easter.

The English Standard Version (ESV) stands in the classic mainstream of English Bible translations over the past half-millennium. Each word and phrase in the ESV has been carefully weighed against the original Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek, to ensure the fullest accuracy and clarity and to avoid under-translating or overlooking any nuance of the original text. The words and phrases themselves grow out of the Tyndale-King James legacy, and most recently out of the Revised Standard Version. Archaic language has been brought to current usage and significant corrections have been made in the translation of key texts. The ESV is an "essentially literal" translation that seeks as far as possible to capture the precise wording of the original text and the personal style of each Bible writer. It seeks to be transparent to the original text, letting the reader see as directly as possible the structure and meaning of the original.

After he had finished all his sayings in the hearing of the people, he entered Capernaum. Now a centurion had a servant who was sick and at the point of death, who was highly valued by him. When the centurion heard about Jesus, he sent to him elders of the Jews, asking him to come and heal his servant. And when they came to Jesus, they pleaded with him earnestly, saying, "He is worthy to have you do this for him, for he loves our nation, and he is the one who built us our synagogue." And Jesus went with them. When he was not far from the house, the centurion sent friends, saying to him, "Lord, do not trouble yourself, for I am not worthy to have you come under my roof. Therefore I did not presume to come to you. But say the word, and let my servant be healed. For I too am a man set under authority, with soldiers under me: and I say to one, 'Go,' and he goes; and to another, 'Come,' and he comes; and to my servant, 'Do this,' and he does it." When Jesus heard these things, he marveled at him, and turning to the crowd that followed him, said, "I tell you, not even in Israel have I found such faith." And when those who had been sent returned to the house, they found the servant well.

Soon afterward he went to a town called Nain, and his disciples and a great crowd went with him. As he drew near to the gate of the town, behold, a man who had died was being carried out, the only son of his mother, and she was a widow, and a considerable crowd from the town was with her. And when the Lord saw her, he had compassion on her and said to her, "Do not weep." Then he came up and touched the bier, and the bearers stood still. And he said, "Young man, I say to you, arise." And the dead man sat up and began to speak, and Jesus gave him to his mother. Fear seized them all, and they glorified God, saying, "A great prophet has arisen among us!" and

"God has visited his people!" And this report about him spread through the whole of Judea and all the surrounding country.

Devotion: Use this resource at home to guide your household's daily devotions. You can do this alone or with others; in the morning, during the day, or at night. Find a routine that works best for you.



Pray: Light a candle and open your devotion time with a prayer.

Reflect: Reflect on the key verses from Sunday's reading.

Study: Study the reading and consider the background.

Jesus is approaching superstar status. No longer are his fellow Jews the only ones putting their hopes on him, but now he is known throughout the region. And sometimes the faith of an outsider can surprise even Jesus.

Consider: Consider this theme for the week's text. Sometimes we might surprise Jesus with our faith.

Read: Read the following daily readings to deepen your understanding of Sunday's text. After the reading, ask the follow-up question.

Sunday: Raising the Widow's Son, Luke 7:1-17 Monday: Jesus Speaks in Parables, Luke 8:4-10 Tuesday: Jesus Speaks in Parables, Luke 8:11-18

Wednesday: Jesus' Mother and Brothers, Luke 8:19-21

Thursday: Jesus Calms a Storm, Luke 8:22-25

Friday: Jesus Heals the Gerasene Demoniac, Luke 8:26-30 Saturday: Jesus Heals the Gerasene Demoniac, Luke 8:31-39

Why do you think Jesus taught and healed people?

Connect: Connect in conversation with others.

- What was a high point of your day? What was a low point?
- Who in your community is in need to prayer and special care? What might you do to help?
- What do you need from God? Can you pray for God's help?

Do: By acting on what we learn we make God's word come alive. Do the following activity this week.

Find out who in your community lives alone. Invite them for coffee.

Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing.

Receive God's blessing when you are with people and when you are alone. Amen.

Learn about Theologian in Residence Harry T. Cook's Books

Harry T. Cook, speaker for the 2017 Theologian-in-Residence weekend has written several books which will be available for sale, including Christianity Beyond Creeds.

Christianity Beyond Creeds argues that the creeds of antiquity have become an intellectual prison for the church, and a comfortable one at that for those who do not wish to be troubled with reflective thinking. What does it mean, for example, to say, "I believe in God the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth" or "I believe in the resurrection of Jesus"? This book presents Harry T. Cook's original analyses of traditional beliefs and their restatement in terms compatible with our own time.
