HOPE, PEACE, JOY, LOVE

During each week in Advent, all households are invited to take home empty Christmas tree ornaments to bring back the next week somehow representing the Advent theme of the week. This week we are distributing balls for hope. Fill them or decorate them as you are so moved. We will hang them on our tree during the passing of the peace next week.

Note: Technically the first Sunday in Advent is December 3. This means the fourth Sunday in Advent is also Christmas Eve. Given the pressure that puts on worship leaders and your own schedules, and in line with our Protestant (protest-ant) heritage, Ames UCC will beginning Advent one week earlier, on November 26. This means that on Sunday, December 24 we will not have a morning worship service. Instead, we will gather in the evening to begin our Christmas celebrations.

GREETINGS

CALL TO WORSHIP

A formal, and mutual, invitation to move into the worship experience.

One: The people who walked in darkness...

Many: Have seen a great light;

One: Those who lived in a land of deep darkness—

Many: On them light has shined.

Singing is one way to connect to God through our bodies. We stand up, breathe deep, and let loose. And as Augustine wrote, "(S)he who sings, prays twice."

INVOKING THE HOLY

God is always with us, so this "invoking" or invitation to God, is really an invitation to our own selves to become aware of that constant presence.

One: O God of all ages, you have never forgotten us. Renew in us your vision of your people restored, and fire us up to bring about your will on earth. In Jesus' name, Amen.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Confession has a long tradition in Christian history. It is a way to name our own brokenness and failing, sometimes generically and sometimes quite specifically, as a means to cleanse our hearts as we move through the service.

One: We confess our brokenness before God and one another. Faithful God, Many: Your promises have never wavered,

and yet we are not always willing to believe them.

We descend into our own despair,

unable to see past our immediate concerns.

We drag others down with us

and live to complain and commiserate.

We ignore the miracles in front of our face.

Forgive us for living such small lives, O Lord,

and restore in us the wonder

of what it is to be your people. Amen.

SILENT PERSONAL CONFESSION

A brief moment to reflect on the prayer and your own heart and life. Silence is as important as noise in our dialogue with the divine.

WORDS OF ASSURANCE

As a people of Easter, there is always good news: when we die to our brokenness, we live again in hope.

One: God is faithful; God is merciful; God does not hold our sins against us! For this we give you thanks, O Lord. Receive the assurance of your deliverance by the One who promised from of old to set us free, and who seeks and finds us to this very day. Alleluia! Amen.


PASSING OF THE PEACE

HEBREW BIBLE Jeremiah 29:1, 4-14 (New Revised Standard Version) We use "Hebrew Bible" instead of "Old Testament" out of respect for our Jewish sisters and brothers (it isn't old to them) and acknowledgement of the living voice still found in these

These are the words of the letter that the prophet Jeremiah sent from Jerusalem to the remaining elders among the exiles, and to the priests, the prophets, and all the people, whom Nebuchadnezzar had taken into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon.

Thus says the LORD of hosts, the God of Israel, to all the exiles whom I have sent into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: Build houses and live in them; plant gardens and eat what they produce. Take wives and have sons and daughters; take wives for your sons, and give your daughters in marriage, that they may bear sons and daughters; multiply there, and do not decrease. But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the LORD on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.

For thus says the LORD of hosts, the God of Israel: Do not let the prophets and the diviners who are among you deceive you, and do not listen to the dreams that they dream, for it is a lie that they are prophesying to you in my name; I did not send them, says the LORD.

For thus says the LORD: Only when Babylon's seventy years are completed will I visit you, and I will fulfill to you my promise and bring you back to this place. For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the LORD, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. Then when you call upon me and come and pray to me, I will hear you. When you search for me, you will find me; if you seek me with all your heart, I will let you find me, says the LORD, and I will restore your fortunes and gather you from all the nations and all the places where I have driven you, says the LORD, and I will bring you back to the place from which I sent you into exile.

SACRAMENT OF HOLY COMMUNION WITH THE OFFERING OF FOOD AND GIFTS

Our Communion table is open to all: young and old, faithful and dubious. No one will be turned away. We serve the bread and the juice through "intinction," which means dipping the bread into the juice. Your server will offer each to you with the phrases "the Bread of Life" and "the Cup of Blessing." If you are unable to come forward but would like to participate in the meal, simply wait for your row to be empty, then raise your hand. A server will come to you. The bread is free of gluten, soy, and dairy. If you have brought canned goods for the Food at First pantry, please set them at the Communion table before being served.

The Communion Prayer

One: Let us gather around the table with the offering of bread and drink upon it and the promise of the Living Christ among us. This is the welcome table of God where all who seek to be at peace with their neighbor and all who seek the mercy of God in Christ are embraced. Come, for we are invited in to this holy mystery. Come.

Many: We are ready!

One: Jesus said: "I am the bread of life. All who come to me shall not hunger, and all who believe in me shall never be thirsty."

Many: We are hungry and thirsty. We come!

One: We remember that on the night of betrayal and desertion, Jesus offered the bread in thanksgiving and said . . .

Many: "Take, eat.

This is my body broken because of you.

Do this in remembrance of me."

One: In the same way, Jesus offered the cup in thanksgiving and said,

Many: "Take, drink.

This is the seal of a new covenant, my poured-out life.

Do this, as often as you drink it in remembrance of me."

One: God, we bless for you this bread that the earth has given and human

hands have made.

Many: May it be for all the Bread of Life!

One: Bless also this cup, fruit of the vine and work of human hands.

Many: May it be for all the Cup of Peace!

One: Bless us too, that by our eating and drinking we may have love for each other and be servants of Christ's peace, until the New Day comes and every creature finds an honored place at the Banquet of Life!

PRAYERS OF OUR SAVIOR

In 2017, nine percent of our total budget will help fund local, regional, and national charitable programs.
