stop at nothing to claim us as God's own. In God's goodness, today,


we are transformed into new creations. Amen.

HEBREW BIBLE Exodus 19:3-7; 20:1-17

We use "Hebrew Bible" instead of "Old Testament" out of respect for our Jewish sisters and brothers (it isn't old to them) and acknowledgement of the living voice still found in these ancient stories.

(A)nd Moses went up to God. The LORD called to him from the mountain, saying, "Thus shall you say to the house of Jacob and declare to the children of Israel: 'You have seen what I did to the Egyptians, how I bore you on eagles' wings and brought you to Me. Now then, if you will obey Me faithfully and keep My covenant, you shall be My treasured possession among all the peoples. Indeed, all the earth is Mine, but you shall be to Me a kingdom of priests and a holy nation.' These are the words that you shall speak to the children of Israel." Moses came and summoned the elders of the people and put before them all that the LORD had commanded him.

God spoke all these words, saying: I the LORD am your God who brought you out of the land of Egypt, the house of bondage: You shall have no other gods besides Me. You shall not make for yourself a sculptured image, or any likeness of what is in the heavens above, or on the earth below, or in the waters under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or serve them. For I the LORD your God am an impassioned God, visiting the guilt of the parents upon the children, upon the third and upon the fourth generations of those who reject Me, but showing kindness to the thousandth generation of those who love Me and keep My commandments.

You shall not swear falsely by the name of the LORD your God; for the LORD will not clear one who swears falsely by His name.

Remember the sabbath day and keep it holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work, but the seventh day is a sabbath of the LORD your God: you shall not do any work—you, your son or daughter, your male or female slave, or your cattle, or the stranger who is within your settlements. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth and sea, and all that is in them, and He rested on the seventh day; therefor the LORD blessed the sabbath day and hallowed it.

Honor your father and your mother, that you may long endure on the land that the LORD your God is assigning to you.

You shall not murder. You shall not commit adultery. You shall not steal. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.

You shall not covet your neighbor's house: you shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or his male or female slave, or his ox or his ass, or anything that is your neighbor's.

All the people witnessed the thunder and lightning, the blare of the horn and the mountain smoking; and when the people saw it, they fell back and stood at a distance.

"You speak to us," they said to Moses, "and we will obey; but let not God speak to us, lest we die."

Moses answered the people, "Be not afraid; for God has come only in order to test you, and in order that the fear of God may be ever with you, so that you do not go astray."


Unscripted: Calmly Connecting with God and Each Other – 10/10, 10/24, 11/14, 11/28

October 14 A New Way to Serve – Advocate for a Community ID Card for Ames As threats increase for our undocumented neighbors, a coalition of churches in Ames has been discussing bringing a community ID card to Ames. Many towns and cities across the U.S. have established community ID cards - the first was issued in New Haven in 2007. This effort can help make communities safer, particularly for the most vulnerable populations such as the homeless, undocumented immigrants, and those fleeing domestic abuse. Members of the congregation's Social Justice and Outreach team will delve into what a community ID card is, what benefits they offer a community, how they vary from town to town, and a few simple things you can do as a community member to support this effort in Ames.
