INVOKING THE HOLY

God is always with us, so this "invoking" or invitation to God, is really an invitation to our own selves to become aware of that constant presence.

One:

O Lord, we hear the story of Noah as a reminder that you never give up on us even though we often do. Assure us of your mercy that we might live into it with confidence and so promise the rest of humanity that we will not let rains of our neglect come again. In Jesus' name, Amen.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Confession has a long tradition in Christian history. It is a way to name our own brokenness and failing, sometimes generically and sometimes quite specifically, as a means to cleanse our hearts as we move through the service.

One: We confess how we have betrayed and forgotten our wholeness

before God and one another. Faithful God,

Many: You have called us to places unknown

and have promised to be our guide.

Yet we prefer to find our own way and do our own thing,

taking credit when things go well

and blaming others when they don't.

We resist putting our trust in you.

We forget your covenant with us.

And we suffer for it.

Turn us around to walk where you are leading.

Forgive us for wandering from the path.

In Jesus' name. Amen.

SILENT PERSONAL CONFESSION

A brief moment to reflect on the prayer and your own heart and life. Silence is as important as noise in our dialogue with the divine.

One:



GOSPEL

Genesis 6:5-22; 8:6-12; 9:8-17 Megan Henson, Ben Schrag (Jewish Publication Society Tanakh translation)

Gospel means "good news," making the full title of this book of the Bible "The Good News of Jesus Christ according to Luke."

Narrator:

The LORD saw how great was man's wickedness on earth, and how every plan devised by his mind was nothing but evil all the time. And the LORD regretted that He had made man on earth, and His heart was saddened. The LORD said,

God:

"I will blot out from the earth the men whom I created—men together with beasts, creeping things, and birds of the sky; for I regret that I made them."

Narrator:

But Noah found favor with the LORD. This is the line of Noah.— Noah was a righteous man; he was blameless in his age; Noah walked with God.— Noah begot three sons: Shem, Ham, and Japheth.

The earth became corrupt before God; the earth was filled with lawlessness. When God saw how corrupt the earth was, for all flesh had corrupted its ways on earth, God said to Noah,

God:

"I have decided to put an end to all flesh, for the earth is filled with lawlessness because of them: I am about to destroy them with the earth. Make yourself an ark of gopher wood; make it an ark with compartments, and cover it inside and out with pitch. This is how you shall make it: the length of the ark shall be three hundred cubits, its width fifty cubits, and its height thirty cubits. Make an opening for daylight in the ark, and terminate it within a cubit of the top. Put the entrance to the ark in its side; make it with bottom, second, and third decks.

"For My part, I am about to bring the Flood—waters upon the earth—to destroy all flesh under the sky in which there is breath of life; everything on earth shall perish. But I will establish My covenant with you, and you shall enter the ark, with your sons, your wife, and your sons' wives. And of all that lives, of all flesh, you shall take two of each into the ark to keep alive with you; they shall be male and female. From birds of every kind, cattle of every kind, every kind of creeping thing on earth, two of each shall come to you to stay alive. For your part, take of everything that is eaten and store it away, to serve as food for you and for them."

Narrator:

Noah did so; just as God commanded him, so he did.

At the end of forty days, Noah opened the window of the ark that he had made and sent out the raven; it went to and fro until the waters had dried up from the earth. Then he sent out the dove to see whether the waters had decreased from the surface of the ground. But the dove could not find a resting place for its foot, and returned to him to the ark, for there was water over all the earth. So putting out his hand, he took it into the ark with him. He waited another seven days, and again sent out the dove from the ark. The dove came back to him toward evening, and there in its bill was a plucked-off olive leaf! Then Noah knew that the waters had decreased on the earth. He waited still another seven days and sent the dove forth; and it did not return to him any more.

And God said to Noah and to his sons with him,

God:

"I now establish My covenant with you and your offspring to come, and with every living thing that is with you—birds, cattle, and every wild beast as well—all that have come out of the ark, every living thing on earth. I will maintain My covenant with you:

never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth."

Narrator: God further said,

God: "This is the sign that I set for the covenant between Me and you,

and every living creature with you, for all ages to come. I have set My bow in the clouds, and it shall serve as a sign of the covenant between Me and the earth. When I bring clouds over the earth, and the bow appears in the clouds, I will remember My covenant between Me and you and every living creature among all flesh, so that the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh. When the bow is in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and all living creatures, all

flesh that is on earth. That,"

Narrator: God said to Noah,

God: "shall be the sign of the covenant that I have established between

Me and all flesh that is on earth."

Please welcome our Seminary Intern, David Sheridan

Our seminary intern, David Sheridan, begins his time with us today. His final Sunday will be Pentecost, June 9, 2019.

When asked why David wanted to be at Ames UCC for this important part of his theological education, he replied, "Ames UCC has a wonderful reputation as a vibrant, progressive, Open and Affirming and Just Peace congregation, led and served by skilled, devoted, and prophetic pastors. I am honored and humbled to have this opportunity to learn about, explore, and hopefully enhance my capacity for pastoral leadership."

Since it has been many years since our last seminary intern, you may be wondering what that means, for David as well as for us as a church.

In practical terms, David will be with us for 10-15 hours each week, mostly on Sundays and Wednesdays. He will do a lot of worship preparation, planning, and presiding, as well as participate in our AMOS efforts and meet with me weekly for reflection.

In terms of pastoral formation, a large part of David's work will be to explore what it means to be a pastor after his lifetime of UCC membership and leadership, what it will require to take on that new and distinct role, in such a familiar space.

The work of the congregation is to welcome David's voice and presence, to provide encouragement, and to affirm the elements of his service to God that are meaningful to you.

If you do have feedback that is toward the constructive end of the spectrum, on a sermon or Bible study, for example, I encourage you to wait until the following day to speak with him. After a morning of preparation and offering, hearing what didn't work is deflating. All pastors need to be open to such feedback, but in recognition of the relationality of church life, it is kinder to offer it at a bit of a distance.

Lastly, if you have any concerns about David's overall potential for ordained parish ministry (which I do not expect), please speak to me directly.

Other than that, feel free to invite him to attend any other offerings in our church, keeping in mind that he may have to decline or postpone due to the limitations of his hours. Having said that, I know David is eager to get to know all of us, and I know you will enjoy getting to know all of him.
