RINGING OF THE MEMORIAL BELL

GREETINGS

CALL TO WORSHIP

A formal, and mutual, invitation to move into the worship experience.

One: Unless the Lord builds the house, Many: Those who build it labor in vain.

One: Come, let us gather in the holy sanctuary.

Many: We bring our hopes, our praise, our sorrow God.

HYMN "God Is Here," Hymn 70

Singing is one way to connect to God through our bodies. We stand up, breathe deep, and let loose. And as Augustine wrote, "(S)he who sings, prays twice."

INVOKING THE HOLY

God is always with us, so this "invoking" or invitation to God, is really an invitation to our own selves to become aware of that constant presence.

One: Merciful Lord, you are at once full of mercy and righteousness. Rouse us from complaisance and light your fire within us again, for the sake of Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Confession has a long tradition in Christian history. It is a way to name our own brokenness and failing, sometimes generically and sometimes quite specifically, as a means to cleanse our hearts as we move through the service.

One: Let us confess our brokenness before God and each other. Merciful Lord, Many: We come before you with heavy hearts.

We do not always follow our Jesus's lead.

We insist on our own way, putting worldly things before you.

We doubt, we discriminate; we scatter—

preferring our ignorance to the brilliance of your truth.

For all this we ask your mercy and forgiveness,

that our hearts may be awoken again. Amen.

SILENT PERSONAL CONFESSION

A brief moment to reflect on the prayer and your own heart and life. Silence is as important as noise in our dialogue with the divine.

WORDS OF ASSURANCE

As a people of Easter, there is always good news: when we die to our brokenness, we live again in hope.


One: As a loving shepherd gathers sheep, so God protects and cares for us. Let us rejoice that we receive forgiveness, a welcome on our return. Amen.

PASSING OF THE PEACE

Passing the Peace is an ancient Christian tradition in which we show we carry no weapons, only love.

CHILDREN'S CELEBRATION

Children are very important to our church. Each service they come forward for a special lesson just for them. We want all children to know they are welcome everywhere in our sanctuary, even – especially – at the very front. We sing the song below as they come forward.



GOSPEL John 2:13-22

(New Revised Standard Version with modifications for clarity and to address elements that might be used for anti-Semitic purposes)

Gospel means "good news," making the full title of this book of the Bible "The Good News of Jesus Christ according to John." We will stay in this book of the Bible until after Easter.

The (Jewish festival of) Passover was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables. Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making God's house a marketplace!"

His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me." The (people) then said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." The (people) then said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?" But he was speaking of the temple of his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

SACRAMENT OF HOLY COMMUNION WITH THE OFFERING OF FOOD AND GIFTS

Our Communion table is open to all: young and old, faithful and dubious. No one will be turned away. We serve the bread and the juice through "intinction," which means dipping the bread into the juice. Your server will offer each to you with the phrases "the Bread of Life" and "the Cup of Blessing." If you are unable to come forward but would like to participate in the meal, simply wait for your row to be empty, then raise your hand. A server will come to you. The bread is free of gluten, soy, and dairy. If you have brought canned goods for the Food at First pantry, please set them at the Communion table before being served.

Gather

One: May God be with you Many: And also with you.

One: Lift your hearts.

Many: We lift them up to God.

One: Let us give thanks to the God we love. Many: We freely give God thanks and praise.

One: Holy are you, Eternal One. You sit above, through, within the circle of the earth setting light into being, casting the stars in the sky, founding the evolving earth, and all that dwell within it.

Limitless is your power, and great is your wisdom. You look upon the lowly as your most cherished creatures. You visit upon the downtrodden with presence, grace, and the promise of eternal justice.

You sent to us your own child, Jesus, who reached into unexpected places, calling women beyond the limits of their times, equipping men for nurturing love, welcoming children into your holy embrace.

Words of Institution

One: And so we recall that on the night of betrayal and desertion,

The light of the world took bread, broke and gave it to the disciples,
saying:

Many: "This is my body, broken because of you.

Do this for the remembrance of me."

One: And, in like manner, after supper,
Jesus took the cup and after giving thanks give it to them saying,

Many: "This is the cup of the new covenant poured out for you and for all people for the healing of all rifts.

Do this, as often as you drink of it, for the remembrance of me."

Children's Ministry That Fits seeks to describe children's experience in worship and ways to keep them involved on Sunday morning. What do children want to discuss? What do they believe? What moves them to think, feel, wonder and act? (From forward by Joyce E. Bellous)

Csinos went to the source, interviewing a group of selected children about their experiences with God and church over a six-month span. He started to observe four distinct ways, or "spiritual styles," through which young people encounter and begin to know God. David termed these ways as "spiritual styles." The study and explanations of these four spiritual styles—word, emotion, symbol, and action—form the heart and substance of this book. They describe ways that humans express their spirituality and capture their experiences across many religions. The author hopes that parents, ministers, and members that work with children in church will benefit from the study of these four styles "to raise children who are spiritually attuned to encounters with the living God."
