No Holy Communion until Holy Week

We typically take part in the sacrament of Holy Communion on the third Sunday of each month (next week). This month, however, we will wait to come to the feasting table on Maundy Thursday (March, 29 at 7 p.m. at First United Methodist, along with First Christian) and Easter Sunday (April 1 at 7 a.m. at Reiman Garden with First Methodist and First Christian and 10:30 a.m. here at our own church). We will also hold a service on Good Friday at 7 p.m., though it will not include Holy Communion.

RINGING OF THE MEMORIAL BELL

LENTEN CENTERING MUSIC

"Herzliebster Jesu, was hast du verbrochen" Helmut Walcha
Lent is one of many seasons of the church year that developed millennia ago to help guide and
nurture our faith. From Ash Wednesday (February 14) to Holy Saturday (March 31), each of us
is invited to go deeply into the story of Jesus' public ministry as well as his execution through
additional silence and more meditative song. In doing so, we allow the Easter mystery work on
us more powerfully. Oral announcements before worship will resume on the second Sunday of
Easter (April 8).

SILENCE (one minute)

For many of us, nothing is more challenging than silence. During Lent, we will have three moments of silence, each longer than the next, as a means to practice what we just sang. If you feel squirmy or uncomfortable or distracted, that is normal. Try paying attention to the breath moving in and out of your nose and mouth or repeating one or two words as a meditative prayer.

"For God alone my soul waits in silence, for my hope is from the LORD."

SUNG CALL TO WORSHIP FOR LENT

A formal, and mutual, invitation to move into the worship experience, which we will sing during the season of Lent.

All: Be still and know that I am God. Be still and know that I am God. (4x)

INVOKING THE HOLY

God is always with us, so this "invoking" or invitation to God, is really an invitation to our own selves to become aware of that constant presence.

One: O Lord, you stand unmoved by the clamor of the angry crowd. Show us how to trust your power and not those of the forces that do evil. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Confession has a long tradition in Christian history. It is a way to name our own brokenness and failing, sometimes generically and sometimes quite specifically, as a means to cleanse our hearts as we move through the service. Throughout this season of Lent we will use a classic prayer of confession from the Book of Common Prayer. You will see that the prayer has us confess sin and then defines that sin: failure to love.

One: Let us confess our brokenness before God and each other. Merciful Lord, Many: We confess that we are in bondage to sin

and cannot free ourselves.

We have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed by what we have done and by what we have left undone.

We have not loved you with our whole heart.

We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.

For the sake of Jesus Christ, have mercy on us.

Forgive us, renew us, and lead us, so that we may delight in your will

and follow in your ways,

to the glory of your holy name. Amen.

SILENT PERSONAL CONFESSION (two minutes)

Time to reflect on the prayer and your own heart and life. Silence is as important as noise in our dialogue with the divine.

WORDS OF ASSURANCE

As a people of Easter, there is always good news: when we die to our brokenness, we live again in hope.

One: In Jesus Christ—born an outcast, grown to a lover of all, and a liberator in life beyond death—God knows and receives us as we are. Listen, give thanks, and live.

PASSING OF THE PEACE

Passing the Peace is an ancient Christian tradition in which we show we carry no weapons, only love.

CHILDREN'S CELEBRATION

Children are very important to our church. Each service they come forward for a special lesson just for them. We want all children to know they are welcome everywhere in our sanctuary, even – especially – at the very front. We sing the song below as they come forward.

All: Lord prepare me, to be a sanctuary, pure and holy, tried and true and with thanksgiving, I'll be a living, sanctuary, oh for you.

HYMN "I Want Jesus to Walk with Me" (insert)

Singing is one way to connect to God through our bodies. We stand up, breathe deep, and let loose. And as Augustine wrote, "(S)he who sings, prays twice."

GOSPEL John 19:1-16a

(New Revised Standard Version with modifications for clarity of action)

Gospel means "good news," making the full title of this book of the Bible "The Good News of Jesus Christ according to John."

Then Pilate took Jesus and had him flogged. And the (Roman) soldiers wove a crown of thorns and put it on his head, and they dressed him in a purple robe. They kept coming up to him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" and striking him on the face.

Pilate went out again and said to (the local police and religious authorities), "Look, I am bringing him out to you to let you know that I find no case against him." So Jesus came out, wearing the crown of thorns and the purple robe. Pilate said to them, "Here is the man!"

When the (the local police and religious authorities) saw (Jesus), they shouted, "Crucify him! Crucify him!" Pilate said to them, "Take him yourselves and crucify him; I find no case against him." The (the local police and religious authorities) answered (Pilate), "We have a law, and according to that law he ought to die because he has claimed to be the Son of God."

Now when Pilate heard this, he was more afraid than ever. He entered his headquarters again and asked Jesus, "Where are you from?" But Jesus gave him no answer. Pilate therefore said to him, "Do you refuse to speak to me? Do you not know that I have power to release you, and power to crucify you?" Jesus answered him, "You would have no power over me unless it had been given you from above; therefore the one who handed me over to you is guilty of a greater sin."

From then on Pilate tried to release (Jesus), but the (the local police and religious authorities) cried out, "If you release this man, you are no friend of the emperor. Everyone who claims to be a king sets himself against the emperor." When Pilate heard these words, he brought Jesus outside and sat on the judge's bench at a place called The Stone Pavement, or in (Aramaic) Gabbatha.

Now it was the day of Preparation for the Passover; and it was about noon. (Pilate) said to the (the local police and religious authorities), "Here is your King!" They cried out, "Away with him! Away with him! Crucify him!" Pilate asked them, "Shall I crucify your King?" The chief priests answered, "We have no king but the emperor."

Then (Pilate) handed (Jesus) over to (the local police and religious authorities) to be crucified. So they took Jesus;

For thine is the kingdom/kin-dom, the power, and the glory, for ever and ever, Amen.
