PRAYER OF CONFESSION

CHRISTIAN LETTER

Romans 1:7-17 Melissa Haynes
New Revised Standard Version
(modified for inclusive language)

The full name of this book of the Bible is The Letter of Paul to the Romans. Paul was an early, energetic, and zealous convert to the Way of Jesus and his letters to early Christian communities (well before there were churches) are the oldest part of the Christian testament, as the gospels were written down later. Romans is likely the newest of Paul's letters, from about 50 CE.

To all God's beloved in Rome, who are called to be saints: Grace to you and peace from God our Creator and the Lord Jesus Christ.

First, I thank my God through Jesus Christ for all of you, because your faith is proclaimed throughout the world. For God, whom I serve with my spirit by announcing the gospel of Jesus Christ, is my witness that without ceasing I remember you always in my prayers, asking that by God's will I may somehow at last succeed in coming to you. For I am longing to see you so that I may share with you some spiritual gift to strengthen you—or rather so that we may be mutually encouraged by each other's faith, both yours and mine. I want you to know, brothers and sisters and siblings, that I have often intended to come to you (but thus far have been prevented), in order that I may reap some harvest among you as I have among the rest of the Gentiles. I am a debtor both to Greeks and to barbarians, both to the wise and to the foolish—hence my eagerness to proclaim the gospel to you also who are in Rome.

For I am not ashamed of the gospel; it is the power of God for salvation (healing) to everyone who has faith, to the Jew first and also to the Greek. For in it the righteousness of God is revealed through faith for faith; as it is written, 'The one who is righteous will live by faith.'

SACRAMENT OF HOLY COMMUNION

Our Communion table is open to all: young and old, faithful and dubious. No one will be turned away. We serve the bread and the juice through "intinction," which means dipping the bread into the juice. Your server will offer each to you with the phrases "the Bread of Life" and "the Cup of Blessing." If you are unable to come forward but would like to participate in the meal, simply wait for your row to be empty, then raise your hand. A server will come to you. The bread, thanks to in-house baker Ami Frank, is free of gluten, soy, and dairy. If you have brought canned goods for one of our food pantry partners, please set them at the Communion table before being served.
